Swinburne University of Technology (SUT) Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) 2022 Allocation Report

The Higher Education Support (Student Services, Amenities, Representation and Advocacy) Guidelines 2022 require higher education providers to provide a publicly available report on student services and amenities fee (SSAF) allocations and actual expenditure for the year as part of their annual reporting and in the form approved by the Minister. This SSAF Allocation Report is the form approved by the Minister.

Additional reporting was introduced to allow for greater transparency and consistency in SSAF allocations and expenditure.

Please note, the information provided in this SSAF Allocation Report does **not** require auditing by a financial accountant. The SSAF <u>expenditure reporting remains unchanged</u>, more information can be found in the <u>Financial Statements Guidelines</u> for Table A and B providers, and in the <u>Financial</u> <u>Viability Instructions: Applicants and Providers of FEE-HELP (FVI)</u> for all other approved providers.

SSAF Consultation and Achievements

Consultation undertaken with students regarding 2022 SSAF:

Identified priorities as well as proposed fee expenditure were published on the Swinburne website. This webpage was shared with student representative groups for consideration.

Feedback was sought via several different methods:

- I. A workshop with Swinburne Student Life, Swinburne Student Union and the Swinburne Representative Council held in late 2021 to discuss priorities and proposals for funding;
- II. Submissions from any student via email to the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Education, Experience & Employability) eee@swin.edu.au;
- III. Submissions from any student via email to the Student Representative Council via swinsrc@swinburne.edu.au; and
- IV. Submissions from any student via email to the Swinburne Student Union via president@ssu.org.au.

Outcome of the consultation:

Careers

Following the workshop with student representative bodies, the priorities for 2022 funding were determined as follows.

- Student health and wellbeing remains a key area of need for Swinburne, more so in a COVIDnormal and post-COVID future.
- Further to the excellent advances over recent years, including an acceleration due to COVID-19, we will continue to explore ways of making all student services available to our online student community.
- Additional Student Study Spaces remain an area of need as identified by students during the
 workshop. Students also outlined the need for additional recreation spaces and for spaces to
 be improved to provide increased disability support.
- Careers and Employment services remains a key priority as identified by students during the workshop.
- The positive and constructive work of Swinburne Student Life was recognised and it is proposed that the funding levels for this group remain similar to 2021.
- The positive and constructive work of the Swinburne Student Union was recognised and it is proposed that the funding levels for this group increase in 2022.
 - The Swinburne Student Union allocation increased from \$620,500 (2021) to \$720,500 (2022)
- The positive and constructive work of the Swinburne Representative Council is also acknowledged.

Steps undertaken to ensure that SSAF was expensed in accordance with the allowable categories specified in Higher Education Support Act 2003, Section 19-38(4):

SSAF service providers undertook their annual reporting in alignment with the allowable categories. Table 4: SSAF Allocation Summary has been presented by allowable category to demonstrate this compliance.

Achievements/Highlights:

- 41% of the total 2022 SSAF allocation was expended on medical, counselling, health and welfare services, supporting the health and wellbeing of all students. Over 30,000 student consultations/interactions were undertaken for these services in 2022.
- 9% of the total 2022 SSAF allocation was used for Accessibility which offered over 1,500+ student consultations.
- 11% of the total 2022 SSAF allocation was utilised to provide enhanced career and employment support, available to the entire student cohort.
- 106 social and sporting clubs were supported, comprising 4,969 student memberships. The clubs delivered 427 approved club events and contributed to the return of a vibrant campus.
- 6,200 serves of free food were enjoyed by students as part of Orientation and Welcome Back Week events held across February/March and July/August.
- 47 students were supported to compete at UniSport Nationals in Perth during September.
 Participating teams included men's and women's basketball, men's futsal, men's volleyball, mixed netball, swimming, and men's beach volleyball.
- 2,460 non-unique students utilised fully subsidised swimming and partially subsidised gym memberships.
- In support of developing a sense of belonging, 900 Swinburne Online students registered for and received a Study at Home Pack containing a Razor-branded merch.
- A total of 1,843 breakfast packs and over 381kg of sausages were consumed through SSU's BBQ and Breakfast Programs.
- A total of 3,533 tickets were transacted across the SSU Events and Festivals Program with both on-campus and off-campus activations/events.
- Over 2,500 students benefited from SSU's student annual diary/notebook in 2022.

• Over 2,400 SWINE magazines were produced as Swinburne's leading student-led and developed student magazine publication.

maximum SSAF that a higher education provider determines for students studying on a full-time basis. The term "part-time basis" means a study load of less than 75 per cent of the normal full-time student load for the period to which the fee relates. As per part 7 of the Administration Guidelines, the normal EFTSL value for a full-time student studying over a period of one year is 1.0.
